

Spider nevus in the stomach

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


Figure 1 Upper gastrointestinal endoscopy showing a spider nevus in the gastric corpus.

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

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A 59-year-old female complained of intermittent abdominal pain for about one week at the outpatient section. She denied any history of chronic liver diseases. An upper gastrointestinal endoscopy was performed showing a dilation of superficial capillaries presenting with some tiny blood vessels radiating from the center to periphery (*Figure 1*) as well as gastritis and duodenitis. Neither esophageal nor gastric varices were observed. Thus, a diagnosis of spider nevus in the stomach was considered. Pantoprazole was prescribed. She is being followed.
